# 2012 Wildfire & Disaster Awareness Week Recap

Volunteers, agency representatives and businesses joined together for the 9<sup>th</sup> time in what has become one of the most successful disaster preparedness events in Southern California.



In 2012 volunteer work parties prepared over 16,000 full color mailing pieces. School flyers were prepared and delivered to over 6,500 students in the Tri-Community.



Hundreds of volunteer hours are put in each year to plan the events that continue to grow.



#### Wildfire Awareness Week Kickoff:

San Bernardino County kicked off Wildfire Awareness Week 2012 with Supervisor Brad Mitzelfelt presenting the Wrightwood Fire Safe Council (WFSC) with a Proclamation declaring May 6 through May 12, 2012 as Wildfire Awareness Week.





The Kickoff was well attended by representatives from the Angeles National Forest, CALFIRE, San Bernardino County Fire along with crews, representatives and volunteers from local community groups.

The WFSC presented an award to Calfire's Paul Camarena for his outstanding guidance and contributions to the council's activities.
